BTEC Health & Social Care

Years 12 and 13 Health and Social Care are currently revising for their January (13th and 16th January respectively) on Human Lifespan Development and Working in Health and Social Care (again respectively). Fortnightly mock exams show a steady improvement in both groups as they develop their exam skills.

The Year 13 Business students are currently revising for their January 17th Finance Exam, and we spent a revision lesson looking at the financial implications for Arsenal (both students are Arsenal supporters) of signing Youri Tielemans from Leicester City at different stages in his current contract cycle. The students are shown below working through cost, value and potential implications for both Arsenal and Leicester of different valuations and wage structures.



Year 12 Business students are completing their projects on two profit and two not for profit organisations, while, in Key Stage 4, Year 10 Health and Social Care students are revising for February exams on the different life stages humans pass through in a lifetime. Year 11 students will complete, by the end of January, their first run through of the final Unit (on healthy lifestyles and health care plans) that will then be revised thoroughly for the May 2023 exams.



What's been happening in Music

With the World Cup in full swing and the festive season on its way, the music department is abuzz with festive hits and of course the '3 Lions' song!

Year 7 have been learning to play a variety of chords on the ukulele and develop rehearsing and performing skills. Additionally they have been exploring how to use Garage band with a link to music industry careers by learning to compose ringtones.

Year 8 students have been investigating different forms of music notation and how to interpret these successfully into a live music performance that includes the skills of listening, timing, dynamics and cooperation (not to mention playing an instrument!)

Year 9 have been exploring a personalised pathway which allows them to choose an area of music that they enjoy, be it composing, performing or using music technology. The idea behind this is to put students in charge of their own learning and by doing so motivate students to develop musical skills and confidence that they could use to take forward into year 10 should they wish to.









Religious Education

As their teacher, I have been extremely impressed with the motivation and maturity of the Year 9 pupils who have studied two GCSE Themes; Religion, Peace and Conflict and Religion and Life. Both themes include highly controversial matters, which the Year 9's have approached with a fantastic level of both responsibility and shrewdness. During the units, pupils have developed their debating skills with inquisitiveness and a thirst for knowledge. There were also some absolutely fantastic written responses to a fifteen-mark question 'The Death Penalty Should be Used in the UK'. Year 9's would also like to thank the Padre for the question and answer session he ran.

The Year 8s have also shown a good level of inquisitiveness studying Christianity. There was some very good work produced for Jesus miracles, Jesus's death and resurrection, Orthodoxy, Roman Catholicism, Protestantism. As we begin our unit on Buddhism – pupils will cover topics on practicing Buddhism, Buddhism around the world, key beliefs, scriptures, temples, monks, and nuns.

During their first term of High School, the Year 7's have enjoyed a unit learning about Comparative Religion and looking at various religious festivals, including Wesak, Diwali and Christmas. Again, some very good work has been produced with reference to religious symbols, morality, worship, practices, and celebrations.





History Club



Why do you go to history club?

I decided to join history club because I wanted to learn about different events from the past, whilst having fun. I also chose to go to history club to improve my knowledge, so I get higher grades on my tests in lessons.

What type of things do you do in history club?

In the second half SJS started brightly and within 5 minutes the game was level. Daniel who was now playing in goal made several good saves to keep the score at 1-1. With around 5 minutes to play a misplaced pass allowed the SJS centre forward to latch onto the ball and fire SJS into a 2-1 lead.

The final score was 2-1 to SJS.

Match 3 v The English School of Kyrenia.

The final game was the 3rd and 4th play off match. Both teams had lost their opening two matches although KRS had a better goal difference going into the match. The game started quickly with Ronnie playing a through ball to Lorenzo who dispatched past the goalkeeper.

The English School of Kyrenia came out strong in the second half and were able to find an equalising goal. From then on in both teams had a number of chances to win the match. In their course they are told they must study "content must include study of a variety of landscapes from beyond the United Kingdom" so there is no better place to be than on the coastal island of Cyprus!!

They learnt about the origin and development of landforms and landscapes including: cliffs and wave cut platforms, caves, arches and stacks; beaches, simple and compound spits, tombolos, offshore bars, barrier beaches and islands.

The last week of this term was our residential visit to Karpaz to study human impacts on coastal sand dunes.

The 'Epi races' took place on Monday 28th November at Happy Valley, Episkopi.

It was a 2.8km course, starting and finishing on the athletics track. All 20 participants performed brilliantly. We were runners up overall, but a big shout out goes to Maicey who achieved first place in the KS3 girls' category.

Design and Technology

Our DT students have produced some impressive practical work.

Year 7 have been learning about plastics and have made a desk tidy.

Year 8 have been developing their design skills and have produced a clock inspired by a design movement.

Year 9 have made these tealight holders based on imagery from a culture of their choice. They have created a design on the computer and cut it out using our laser cutter.

Finally, year 10 have started their GCSE course learning about their chosen specialist material area of timbers. These mini table and chairs have enabled them to practice a range of wood joints and the use of CADCAM.











Food Preparation and Nutrition

Year 7 have started their food lessons with a unit called 'Skills in Food' which looked at how to be safe and hygienic in the food room. They have produced a range of dishes to practice new skills including couscous salad, Eton Mess and pizza pinwheels.

Year 8 have been learning about the very important food staple – bread. They have made their own bread rolls and have also produced some variations on bread recipes such as yummy cinnamon rolls.

Year 9 are following a unit called Eco Café where they are looking at environmental issues caused by food production. They have been making recipes where they can consider using organic or Fairtrade ingredients.

Our new year 10 GCSE class have made an excellent start to the course. Here are some examples showing their creativity in food presentation.









The Owl Alliance

As part of our whole school initiative to promote activities for More Able students, the idea for the "Owl Alliance" was born and is developing to encourage students to improve their skills of communication. Each week students are given a "Thunk Chunk" to consider. They are free to plan answers in any way they choose and once a week invited to a forum where thoughts are shared and considered, sometimes debated, in an open and respectful atmosphere. The approach is different each week, with students working in teams, at times alone and at times against the House Mrs Sturgess. Students Speaker, are developing skills of public speaking, debating. Whilst listening to each other and their ability to persuade and tolerate differences.


Competition winners:

The runner-up entries consisted of a decorated poem and art work;





International Projects – E-twinning

KS3 students at King Richard School have been participating in an E-twinning project with schools all over Europe. The club focuses on developing cultural awareness and links. We have created a video presentation to present the island of Cyprus, Larnaca, the camps and KRS and we have shared it on the online platform. We have also been able to watch and read presentations from three other schools, Collège Paul Verlaine in Béthune (France), IES Padre Anchieta in Tenerife (Spain) and Bors Skola in Värnamo (Sweden).

Before the holidays, we have been writing New Year's cards to pupils in Sweden and we are excited to receive our cards from France! When January comes, we will log onto the online platform to start discussion and projects through forums and videocalls with multicultural and multilingual teams on social and environmental issues for example. We are also waiting to receive the mascot, Ratatouille, who is travelling across the four countries! After Spain, it will come to Cyprus !

It is great to witness how pupils in other countries are learning English and it is eye opening to realise that their level of English is not quite what we would expect. It makes us realise that we must work hard at learning a foreign language if we want to communicate with more people worldwide!





History–Student Report

During our court roleplay in history, I played the role of head juror. This meant that I had to listen carefully to both the defending and prosecuting team and then deliver my final verdict at the end. Both teams gave great points but at the end the judge decided that Sir Douglas Haig was innocent. Both teams had witnesses including Sir Douglas Haig himself. The prosecution team made excellent points to say that Sir Douglas Haig was a butcher for example, he continued with a very predictable plan and the barbed wire that protected the German trenches wasn't damaged at all. However, the protecting team also made excellent points for example, England still won the war using his tactics and around 600,000 German soldiers were killed which was more than the English and French death count. Overall the defending team got more points (which me, the other jurors and the judge were counting) and they won the court case proving that Sir Douglas Haig was innocent. The prosecuting team was slightly upset but had accepted defeat. I really enjoyed doing this because we all got different roles and we all got to express our feeling about the case in court. It was an amazing experience and I really hope that we can do it again in the future.

Computing

To encourage and enthuse student's participation in Computer Science, Mr Lau entered students from Years 7, 8, 9 and those doing Computing as an option into The Oxford University UK Bebras Challenge 2022. Bebras is a challenge which introduces Computational Thinking to students and gets them excited about the world of computing. This is the first year that students at KRS have been entered into such a national event, and a total of 88 of our students took up and entered the challenge. Awards have been given for Distinction (top 25% in the school) and Merit (next 25%). There were also 5 awards for Best in the school (Juniors, 2x Intermediate, Seniors and Elite).

I am super excited and proud to announce that 3 of our students have been awarded the Gold Award which is for those that came in the Top 10% nationally, which is outstanding.



Code club attendance increased this month as more budding computer scientists and gamers came along to get involved in the activities. Continuing with the Gaming theme this term, our Sixth form students studying Computing headed down to Larnaca to the INSPOT Gaming Lounge for a look around and even had time to get a few games in.





International Projects

Anthea Bell Prize, Oxford University

We are very excited to announce that Oxford University has given us the opportunity, for the first time in it's history, to enter the Anthea Bell Young Translators Prize in a unique category of our own "Schools Based Abroad". In order to create the category, we needed to create an alliance with other schools and this year's collaboration will take place between King Richard School, Dhekelia, Queen Berengaria School, Dhekelia and St. David's School, Ramstein. Following this years competition, we hope to grow and develop the project to promote wider participation across the globe with an invitation to all MOD Schools.





SMSC

KS3 pupil have spent the past term learning about a range of topics including; Alcohol, Drugs, Smoking, Vaping, Personal Identity, Body Image and the role of the media, online safety, bullying and an extensive set of lessons on Anti-Social Behaviour.
